Letter to judge asking for leniency sample

Newark -- Letters from friends and family, from politicians and ministers, from parents and children. They wrote to U.S. District Judge Susan Wigenton, urging leniency for Bill Baroni and Bridget Ann Kelly, who were due to be sentenced on Wednesday for their roles in the scandal. While not often made public, defense lawyers attach copies of more than 100 characters - some of them hand-written and most of them felt heart-felt - that were sent to the judge in the past few weeks to confirm with the character and strength of the two defendants they considered friends. A few people from familiar figures, including the former Gov. James McGreevey, many of whom came from close childhood friends. Kelly's 17-year-old son Conor was born with a rare heart defect, telling the judge his mother was the most rational. He's alive. My mother is and remains an innocent woman. Neither a part of me nor anyone else who knew or ever met my mother, believed she was truly guilty and should have seen a day in prison, he wrote. On behalf of Baroni, one surprising letter came from Rabbi Mendy Carlebach, who became part of the Bridgegate story himself after the release of an email from David Weidstein, a self-professed architect of the Lane Closure Project, who has expressed his annoyance at Carlebach's habit of showing up at public events wherever the governor has appeared. Baroni, a former deputy director of the Port Authority and Kelly, a one-time deputy chief of staff to Gov. Chris Christie, was charged with helping with several local road closures at the George Washington Bridge in 2013 in a scheme of political sanctions targeting the mayor of Fort Lee, his refusal to endorse the governor instead of re-election. After a seven-week trial, he faces between 37 and 46 months in prison under federal sentencing guidelines. The U.S. Attorney's Office has recommended sentences lower or lower than those guidelines, or about three years. Defense lawyers have called for probationary sentences or some home detention. Here's some excerpts of those filed by lawyers for Baroni and Kelly: Letters on behalf of Bill Baroni (Ed Murray) | Kenneth B. In many of our interactions, I have always found Bill a kind, smart, generous, publicly generous person. He has made significant contributions to New Jersey and New York City. I To work with Bill Baroni on many settings - in my professional ability as a politician, as a businessman, interested in how investors can solve public problems and as volunteers work for major causes. In each of these settings, I found a bill to be a good, hard-working community. Rabbi Mendy Carlebach believes bill's success throughout his career of being a lawyer, adjunct professor, general assembly, NJ state senator, above all, most individuals can achieve in life. In addition, the bill's success has affected countless people from his work on paid sick leave in the Legislature to inspire others to lead a healthier lifestyle. From my understanding, Bill's conviction will bar him from continuing to do two things he likes a lot. Practice law and serve as a public servant. I know this whole ordeal has ruined his career, but I write in honor of your greater importance on this matter has affected the party bill in a dramatic way. As I noted at the beginning of my letter, I have come across many people as practicing members of the Royal Family, but it is my firm belief that Bill Baroni is a good man to be - if given the opportunity to continue to help people out and lead by example and as a productive, co-member of society. The fact that he may not be able to comply with the law or accept future public employment, at least temporarily, has been a very important part of his life, his career and his very own ideas. Some people, after paying their debts to society, may be able, in the sense, to get where they left off, that would not be precisely possible for Bill, and that would only be a harsh price for him to pay in addition to the sentences he received. Judge Wigenton's father, I respect the mercy of this court when Bill, Jr. was sentenced. I pray that you will give sincere consideration to that decision and that you will in considering all of the good that Bill Jr. has achieved in his life; and he can give society a second chance. He's not an easy guy. Kelly got into town after joining Assemblyman David Russo, a central Bergen County Republican, and joined the governor's staff after working on his first election campaign. Bishop Reginald Jackson, the former executive director of the Black Council of New Jersey, a jury of her friends, has convicted her and is now responsible for her sentencing. Liam Daul, Kelly's brother from Bridget, has been punished for her involvement should the lane be closed. Getting a new job is impossible, her email address is published and is flooded with hate messages and threats... The past three years have been unimaginably difficult for our family.
